## Building a Child's Foundation for Salvation and Baptism

Emmaus Baptist Church statement about a child's spiritual journey (Courtney Ingram):

- "A child's spiritual journey begins at home,
- is cultivated in daily life,
- encouraged by the *Church*, and
- provides a foundation on which they can *build their own faith.*"

Stages of Spiritual Development (Art Murphy, former Children's Pastor at FBC Orlando; President of Children's Ministry Solutions)

- Discovering
- Discerning
- Deciding
- Discipling

Ready or Not? These questions help determine if a child is ready to make a commitment to Christ:

- Is there brokenness over sin?
- Does the child understand the basics of **salvation** and how this impacts his or her life?
- Is the child **serious** about this decision?
- Does faith in Jesus and the **significance** of baptism make sense to the child?
  - A young child's "trinity" may consist of Santa Claus, the Easter Bunny, and the Tooth Fairy.
  - If a child is at the stage where pretend characters like these are real, then it may be best to delay in making the decision public.
- Was this decision **Spirit-directed** and **self-made**? In other words, is the child responding to the work of the Holy Spirit, not the pressure or prompting of parents or church leaders?
